Themes from Ephesians

"Predestination, Election, and Comfort" – Eph. 1:3-6 I. Introduction

- A. The position of blessing
 - 1. Text Ephesians 1:3
 - 2. Verse 3 becomes the basis for introducing the doctrine of election.
- B. Election / Predestination
 - 1. Perhaps the most misunderstood and reviled doctrine found in Christendom.
- C. Main Text: Ephesians 1:4-6,11

II. Exposition

- A. Key observations
 - 1. Verse 5, 11 *Predestined* or "to be marked out beforehand."
 - 2. This predestination is based upon God's will alone, vs. 5,11.
 - a. Paul goes out of his way to emphasis this as did John in John 1:12-13.
- B. Key words
 - 1. "Just as" Links verses 3-4.
 - 2. "Chose" to pick out or elect.
 - 3. "Adoption" place and condition of a son given to whom it does not naturally belong, verse 5.

C. Three Views of Election

- 1. Denial of election outright.
- 2. Election is based upon foreknowledge (Prescient view).
 - a. Problems
 - 1. Election such as this is not really election.
 - 2. Man's spiritual condition is hopeless Ro. 3:10-18.
 - 3. The real problem is not election, but over man's depravity Eph. 2:1; Ro. 3:11; John 6:44; Gen. 6:5.
 - b. Sometimes an appeal is made to Romans 8 for support.

 Yet, this view of election does not offend people, but
 Paul's view does and he knew it! (Romans 9).
- 3. Election pure and simple.
 - a. God saved me when I did not even know better.
 - b. Is the question, "Why did He not save all?" or "Why did He save anyone?"

- B. Election gives assurance of salvation (**COMFORT**).
- C. Election leads to holiness.
- D. Election promotes evangelism.
- E. Election creates wonderment, mystery, and awe for God's plan.
