 - 1. Contemporary English –
 - 2. Greek is *mysterion* and means the mystery is not knowable and only revealed to a select few.

 - a. No alliance between Jew & Gentile.
 - b. No friendly agreement between Jew & Gentile.
 - c. No combination between Jew & Gentile.
 - d. No partnership between Jew & Gentile.
 - e. Rather a permanent <u>f</u>_____.
 - 5. Controversy of Acts 1-15.
 - a. Jesus + anything is heresy. Galatians 1:6-9.
