 - d. President Andrew Jackson
 - 4. "Taskmasters <u>pressed</u> them," verse 13. a. Hurry or hasten
- B. Verse 14
 - 1. Note the cruelty of the Hebrew situation.
 - a. Illustration from auto industry production processing.
- C. Verses 15-16
 - 1. Note that the Hebrew foremen <u>did not</u> cry out to Yahweh. a. Servants of Pharaoh

- 2. "It is the fault of your own people," verse 11.
- D. Verses 17-19
 - 1. "So go now and <u>work</u>," verse 18.
 - 2. Work means serve. This is pivotal in understanding this book.
 - a. Who will the people serve? Yahweh or Pharaoh.
 - 3. "Trouble," verse 18, literally "evil"a. Word play with Egyptian god named Ra.

 - a. Figure of speech
 - b. Irony when one thinks about the future state of the Nile River.
