 - 1. "No foreigner" a non-Israelite. Deuteronomy 23:20.
 - B. Verses 44-45.
 - 1. Only one exception regarding outsiders
 - a. A slave who has been circumcised Genesis 17:12-13.
 - C. Verse 46.
 - 1. Diverse interpretation on this verse.
 - 2. Best view is whole of sacrifice is to be eaten by the whole family John 19:36; I Corinthians 5:7.
 - D. Verse 47.
 - 1. "All the congregation." Entire congregation without exception.

- E. Verses 48-49.
 - 1. Sojourners had rights, but not a right to Passover apart from circumcision.
- F. Verse 50. "Then all the sons of Israel did so."
 - 1. An idiom in the book of Exodus;

Ex 12:28, 12:50; 16:17; 39:32; 39:42

- G. Verse 51. Fulfillment of prophecy to Abram. Gen. 15:13-14.
- H. Verses 13:1-2. At first glance appears to be out of place.
- I. Verses 3-5.
 - 1. Third set of Passover laws and reiteration of promise.
- J. Verses 6-7. Climax on seventh day.
- K. Verses 8-10. Children must know the meaning of the holiday.
- III. Points for Reflection.
 - A. Passover is a type which displays the pattern of salvation.
 - B. Passover was a deliverance of the <u>whole</u> just as we experience deliverance to become a part of the <u>whole</u>.
 - C. The exclusiveness of Passover reminds us of the exclusiveness of the Lord's table.
 - D. Just as circumcision gave access to the Passover feast, so too baptism provides access to communion.
 - E. They told their children, and we must do the same.
