 - B. Note the difference between saving and making salvation possible.

- II. Practical Application of this Doctrine
 - A. It beckons us to rest in our adoption.
 - 1. Eph. 1:4,5; Gal. 4:4,5; Rom. 8:15.
 - 2. Implicit in the term "adoption."
 - a. Implies an act of transfer from an alien family into the family of God.
 - 1. We were children of wrath Eph. 2:3, Col. 3:6 John 8:44; Col. 1:13,14.
 - b. Implies that God is creator of all, but only Father to some. I John 3:1
 - B. It beckons us to remember the benefits of our adoption.
 - 1. Confidence in prayer.
 - a. Romans 8:15, 16; 8:26
 - 2. We are treated with compassion.

- 3. Receive loving discipline
 - a. Hebrews 12:5-11
- 4. Secures safety to the end.
