#10 – "A Warning Against Unbelief" – Hebrews 3:7-12

- I. Maintaining a high view of Scripture.
 - A. Devaluing of Scripture is common in the North American church.
 - 1. Examples
 - B. The Hebrews' writer has a high view of Scripture.
 - 1. "God spoke to our fathers by the prophets," Heb. 1:1.
 - 2. "Therefore, as the Holy Spirit says," Heb. 3:7.
 - 3. The Apostle Peter II Peter 1:21.
 - a. Note also Hebrews 3:7-8
 - 1. Present tense of the verb "Holy Spirit says."
 - 4. Consequently, do not harden your hearts.

- A. Hebrews 3:7-9
 - 1. The Holy Spirit as author
 - 2. Warning to not harden heart Heb. 3:7-8, 13; 3:15; 4:7
 - 3. "Today" speaks to relevance now.
 - 4. D. L. Moody
 - 5. Review of what happened in Israel when they hardened their hearts.
 - a. The people complained even though they had been miraculously delivered Ex. 16:2-3
 - 1. Ingratitude and unbelief

- b. It was a time of testing Ex. 17:2-4
- c. Numbers 14 is also being referred to by the Hebrews writer.
 - 1. The spies of Numbers 13 came back with an unfavorable report.
 - 2. Numbers 14:8-9
 - 3. God would later say... Numbers 14:11.
 - 4. Moses pleads for Israel Numbers 14:19
- B. Hebrews 3:10-11
 - 1. To "go astray in the heart"
 - 2. The heart is the center of the soul.
 - 3. They shall not enter my rest.
 - a. John MacArthur
 - 4. Pastor Don's experience in Israel.
- C. Hebrews 3:12
 - 1. The Hebrews writer adds emphasis to what he has been saying.
 - 2. Unbelief is a serious sin. It is dangerous to hear the truth repeatedly and to harden the heart.
 - 3. "Unbelieving heart"
 - a. Unbelief and apostasy go together.

- A. How does a hard heart develop within a person?
 - 1. Genesis 3:6; Hebrews 10:26-31
- B. Beware of clinging to your own self-righteousness.
- C. Note the illustration of Massah and Meribah once again.
 - 1. II Peter 1:10
