"Who is My Brother?"

- I. The call to be neighborly.
  - A. Mr. Rodgers?
    - 1. Background.
    - 2. His theology is reflective of the age and has now gained a hold on many within the church.
  - B. Key Text and numerous interpretation errors.
    - 1. Matthew 25:31-46.
- II. Exposition.
  - A. Expository errors.
    - 1. Failure to note context.

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a. Part of a	grouping	of	parables	concerned	with	judgment
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- 2. Failure to identify the hungry and needy.
  - a. Leads to the social gospel (felt needs only).
- 3. Failure to understand Jesus' usage of the first person.
  - a. Wrong conclusion All men have spark of divinity.1. Rebuttal. Note Genesis 3:5.
  - b. Wrong conclusion Global presence of universal religion is evidence of universal presence of Christ.
    - 1. Rebuttal. Note Romans 1:16-32.
- 4. Failure in concluding mankind is all a part of the universal fatherhood of God.
  - a. Matthew 25:40 brother Hence all men are brother.
  - b. Rebuttal. Universal fatherhood of God destroys the doctrine of adoption Eph. 1:4-6.

- B. Exposition of the text.
  - 1. No question that God calls upon His people to care for the needy.
    - a. James 2:14-26.
  - 2. Who are the brothers? verse 40.
    - a. Greek is *adelphos(oi)*.
    - b. Matthew is the only writer of this parable. He has previously signaled how to interpret the mercy of vs. 40.
      - 1. Matthew 12:46-50.
      - 2. He is referring to <u>Christians</u> in need.
        - a. Repeated in Mark 3:31-35; Luke 8:19-21.
        - b. Also see I Timothy 5:8.
      - 3. Error of Desmond Tutu and legions of others.
    - c. More examples.
      - 1. Matthew 23:8.
      - 2. Matthew 28:10,16.
      - 3. Look more closely at our main text Matthew 25:32.
        - a. If a <u>nation</u> rejects a brother it also rejects Christ.
        - b. Note backdrop of Matthew 10.
          - 1. Concluding reading: Matthew 10:40-42.

## III. Points for Reflection.

- A. The brothers of Matthew 25 is a reference to the people of God.
- B. In the course of carrying out this duty to present the truth brethren become hungry, thirsty, strangers, naked, sick, and imprisoned.
- C. But what about those in the world who are not Christians and suffer hardship? Do we turn a blind eye and deaf ear to their need? NO!
  - 1. Lev. 19:18,34; Luke 10:27; Rom. 13:9; Gal. 5:14; James 2:8.
