This is replaced with the "I know" formula such as 2:2 – "I know your deeds and toil and perseverance," etc.

Ephesus – Early church period

Smyrna – Persecution during patristic period


Pergamum – Time of Constantine

Thyatira – Middle age period

Sardis – Reformation period

Philadelphia – Missionary outreach during 18th & 19th century.

Laodicea – Modern period, apostasy leading to Christ's return.

Also note the center message to Thyatira. 2:23b is the center of this sermon:

"and all the churches will know."

- 1. "The one who holds the seven stars in His right hand, the One who walks among the seven golden lampstands, says this," 2:1.
- 2. The first and the last, who was dead and has come to life, says this, 2:8.
- 3. The one who has a two-edged sword, says this, 2:12.
- 4. The Son of God, who has eyes like a flame of fire, says this, 2:18.

- 5. He who has the seven spirits of God and the seven stars, says this, 3:1.
- 6. He who is holy, who is true, who has the key of David, who opens and no one will shut, and who shuts and no one opens, <u>says this</u>, 3:7.
- 7. The Amen, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of creation of God, says this, 3:14.

Comfort zone Christianity is comfortable with the <u>world</u>.

Doctrine
