 - a. "Dressed in white"
 - 1. White clothes as a metaphor for m_____ and s condition.
 - 2. Texts: Rev. 6:11; 7:9, 13-14; Matt 28:3; John 20:12; Acts 1:10; Dan 7:9
 - 3. Toga in first century politics.
 - b. "No erasing of his name from the book of life."

- 1. Widespread usage of metaphor in the Old Testament: Ex 32:30-33; Ps 9:5; Isa 4:3; Dan 12:1. New Testament usages: Phil 4:3; Luke 10:20; Heb 12:23
 - a. Used six times in Revelation: 3:5; 13:8; 17:8; 20:12,15; 21:27.
