 - 1. Herod the Great.
 - a. Never accepted as King of the Jews.
 - 2. Zacharias "Yahweh has remembered."
 - a. Division of Abijah, verse 5.
 - 1. Background on this class of priests.
 - b. "Walking blamelessly"
 - 1. Not sinless but similar to Job.
 - c. Significance of no child, verse 7.

B. Luke 1:11-17

- 1. Sees an angel.
 - a. Fear background on the Greek term.
 - b. Typical of encounters with angelic beings.
- 2. No ordinary son.
- 3. Luke 1:16-17
 - a. Malachi 4:5-6
 - b. Harmonious homes are in Christ.

C. Luke 1:18-22

- 1. He prayed for it, but when it came he could not believe it.
 - a. Chrysostom
 - b. "I am Gabriel" emphatic.
 - c. The people would have been wondering about the delay. i.e. Nadab & Abihu, 2 Sam. 6:3-4,6-7; 2 Chr. 26:16-21

III. Points for Reflection

- A. Note historical markers by Luke
 - 1. "In the days of Herod"
 - 2. No evolution in Christianity.
 - 3. The concern is about truth.
 - a. Jesus before Pilate John 18
 - 4. Rosaria Butterfield.
- B. Contact with the Holy always creates fear in human beings.
 - 1. Genesis 3:7-8
- C. Zacharias heard the angels and had the answer to his prayer, but he could not tell anyone. Why don't we tell anyone?
 - 1. Why are we as mute as Zacharias?
- D. When you read the Bible, believe the Bible.
 - 1. Zacharias should not have doubted and neither should we.
