# Insights from Luke

#23 – "Doing the Loving Thing and the Right Thing" – Luke 7:36-50

- I. Introduction.
  - A. Love and loving in the media.
    - 1. Sometimes at the expense of doing the right thing.
    - 2. Examples New community support group.
  - B. Today's text
    - 1. Jesus includes love with doing the right thing.
    - 2. Luke 7:36-50
- II. Exposition
  - A. Luke 7:36
    - 1. An invitation to dine at someone's home was a common first century practice.
    - 2. Note description of a typical setting.
  - B. Luke 7:37-38
    - 1. "Woman in the city who was a sinner."
    - 2. Unusual for her to be present and we do not know her identity.
    - 3. "Sinner Emphasized 3 times Verses 37, 39, 47
    - 4. Astonishment on the part of the attenders.
    - 5. She is overwrought with emotion.
      - a. Socially unacceptable The letting down of hair according to the Talmud (the central text of Rabbinic Judaism).
    - 6. "Kissing of His feet," verse 38.
      - a. Passionate and repetitive.
  - C. Luke 7:39
    - 1. Pharisaic mindset Judgmental and quick to C\_\_\_\_\_.
    - 2. "This sort of woman." Pejorative.
      - a. Possible sexual connotation I Cor. 7:1
  - D. Luke 7:40-43
    - 1. A parable is inserted to the discussion.

- 2. Economics is not the point, but rather the debt of sin.
- E. Luke 7:44-46
  - 1. Simon physically saw the woman, but in another sense did not see her at all.
  - 2. Contrast between the woman and Simon.

### F. Luke 7:47

- 1. The woman knew the depth of her own sin.
- 2. The greater the knowledge of personal sin and its forgiveness, the greater the love.

#### G. Luke 7:48

- 1. The bombshell explodes again. "Your sins are forgiven." Luke 5:17-24
- 2. Clarification needed Note Roman Catholic and Protestant view of this event.
  - a. A Roman Catholic theologian, Robert Sungenis, argues that "faith alone" is incorrect.
  - b. However, if faith must have work added to it, the entire text becomes distorted.
  - c. "<u>Sins are forgiven</u>" is in the perfect tense, meaning that this was done previous to the woman's emotional display.
  - d. Note how the Jerusalem Bible endeavors to convey this meaning.
  - e. Her faith saved her which <u>had been</u> given by God. 1. Eph. 2:1-3, 8-9

### III. Points for Reflection

- A. Do we ever treat Jesus the same as Simon?
- B. How thoroughly do we see the depth of sin within our souls?
- C. The doctrine of sin is still needed to confront the world as well as a reminder for the church.
- D. In order to love Jesus more does not mean we all have to fall into deep sin.
