#47 – "Wisdom about Riches" – Luke 12:13-20

- I. Introduction
 - A. Wealth is often viewed as the sum of all things.
 - 1. Prosperity is value/moral neutral.
 - 2. Prosperity can be alluring and facilitate a worldly view of life.
 - a. Eighties rock group ABBA "Money, Money, Money"
 - 3. How much wealth is enough?

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- B. The antidote for this wrong view of life is found in today's text.
 - 1. The central figure of today's text wants his share of inheritance.

II. Exposition

- A. Luke 12:13
 - 1. Jesus is asked to adjudicate, but refuses.
 - 2. The man's request shows that he did not track with Jesus' instruction.
 - 3. Jesus is not Judge Wapner.
- B. Luke 12:14
 - 1. Israel had a system in place to deal with civil matters such as the man's request. Num. 27:1-11; Deut. 21:15-17
- C. Luke 12:15
 - 1. A classic teaching moment.
 - 2. "Beware" "Recognize this"

- 3. "Every form of greed."

 a. Inordinate desire for R
- 4. Wealth is <u>not</u> the measure of all things.
- D. Luke 12:16-19 (The Parable)
 - 1. Money magazine's Man of the Year.
 - 2. Needed extra space for his goods.
 - 3. No thankfulness.
 - 4. Self-absorbed.
 - a. Note first person words "I" "Me" "My"

E. Luke 12:20-21

- 1. Internal conversation.
- 2. Focus was upon the world Psalm 49:10
- 3. Self-absorption can become a problem for the Christian, too.
- 4. The greater the prosperity, the greater the responsibility.
- 5. "Rich toward God."
 - a. Spiritual life flow can become restricted by prosperity in the life of a believer as blood flow becomes restricted in a person who has atherosclerosis.

III. Points for Reflection.

- A. This parable is teaching us that a retirement package can became a ticket to hedonism.
- B. To live life without thought of God is to live the life of a fool.
- C. Contentment is the key to reigning in all kinds of covetousness.
- D. We all have a tendency to dominate the board.
