#55 – "The Compassion of Christ" – Luke 13:31-35

I. Introduction

- A. Contemplating the idea of the Trinity.
 - 1. Illustrations to understand it.
 - 2. A sub-category underneath the doctrine of the Trinity is the dual nature of Christ.
 - a. Hypostatic union -- Philippians 2:5-8
 - b. Sometimes Christians remember Jesus' deity, but forget about his humanity.
- B. Consider a renowned picture of Christ.
 - 1. Warner Sallman's depiction of Christ.
 - 2. Violation of the second commandment Exodus 20:4
 - 3. Philip Ryken
- C. Today's Text Luke 13:31-35

II. Exposition

- A. Luke 13:31
 - 1. Note setting He had been talking about the narrow door.
 - 2. Advice offered from the Pharisees.
 - a. They were actually His enemies Luke 11.
 - 1. Sincerity in the question.
- B. Luke 13:32-33
 - 1. Possible communication between Herod and the Pharisees.

- 2. "Fox" an idiom cunning person.
- 3. Emphasis upon Jesus' work.
 - a. He was resolute in completing the Father's business.
- 4. Contrast to our unfinished business.
 - a. John 4:34; 17:4; 19:30
- 5. Verse 33 a holy obligation.
 - a. Luke 9:22; 9:51

C. Luke 13:34

- 1. Similar to Matthew's recording, but this remark was during the week of the cross Matthew 23:37-39.
- 2. Jerusalem almost synonymous for rejection of prophets.
 - a. Zechariah, Jeremiah, Nehemiah

D. Luke 13:35

- 1. "Behold" Something important is coming.
- 2. A house desolate
 - a. Various views on meaning.
- 3. Note Israel's long history of rebellion.
- 4. Yet, Jesus still leaves the door cracked for those prepared to come to faith.
 - a. Psalm 118:26

III. Points for Reflection

- A. Praise God, Jesus reached His goal!
- B. Jesus understood our heartbreak over people who refuse to repent and continue to accumulate wrath upon their heads.
- C. The offer of salvation, coupled with the command to repent, is generally made to all people.
