## Insights from Luke

#63 – "Wealth Management" – Luke 16:1-13

- I. Introduction
  - A. Tearing down idols in our lives.
    - 1. Pastor Don's initial experience.
      - a. Idol #1
      - b. Idol #2
  - B. The use of money and material things and today's text.
    - 1. Contrast between Chapter 15 & Chapter 16
      - a. Wrong attitudes towards people vs. wrong attitudes toward possessions.
    - 2. Very perplexing parable.
      - a. Today's Text: Luke 16:1-13
- II. Exposition
  - A. Luke 16:1a
    - 1. Jesus had been addressing the Pharisees (Chapter 15).
    - 2. Now he addresses the disciples.
    - 3. "Squandered" same term used to describe the prodigal son.
  - B. Luke 16:1b-2
    - 1. Similar to news reports today.
    - 2. Being fired from a job is never easy.
  - C. Luke 16:3
    - 1. Thoughts from the non-canonical book of "Ecclesiasticus".
    - 2. Loss of job What am I going to do?
  - D. Luke 16:4
    - 1. His plan initiated after official termination, but before separation.
  - E. Luke 16:5-7
    - 1. Is the unjust worker writing off a portion of interest?
    - 2. Was he giving up his commission?
    - 3. Simply put He was stealing from his employer to help his own situation.

- - a. Bernie Madoff was diabolically deceitful, but equally resourceful.
  - 4. This parable leads to three lessons concerning:
    - a. Worldly wealth Luke 6:9
    - b. Be faithful with what you have Luke 6:10-12
    - c. Do not allow riches to become your god Luke 6:13
- G. Luke 16:8-9
  - 1. Verse 8 "Sons of this age" People of the world.
    - a. Christians should not think in these terms.
  - 2. Verse 9 The point: Use your wealth to make everlasting friends. This is Lesson #1.
  - b. Hughes.
- H. Luke 16:10-12
  - 1. Be faithful now so that you may receive something far greater.
    - This is Lesson #2.
    - a. "If I had a million dollars, I could...."
      - 1. Be careful.
- I. Luke 16:13
  - 1. Do not let material things become your master. This is Lesson #3.
- III. Points for Reflection
  - A. The central point of Jesus' use of this parable was <u>not</u> because the steward cheated, but because he exercised foresight into the future.
  - B. Let's take an honest gut check of what we really are giving to the Kingdom.
  - C. Keep in mind that mammon (wealth or riches) refers to all of our material possessions.
  - D. The words of Christ are tougher than Moses' words in the Book of the Law.
