#63: "Wealth Management" Luke 16:1-13

Luke 16:1a

"1 Now He was also saying to the disciples..."

Luke 16:1b-2

"1b There was a rich man who had a manager, and this manager was reported to him as squandering his possessions. ² And he called him and said to him, 'What is this I hear about you? Give an accounting of your management, for you can no longer be manager."

"It is depressing even if you are a crook."

Luke 16:3

"3 The manager said to himself,
'What shall I do, since my master
is taking the management away
from me? I am not strong enough
to dig; I am ashamed to beg.""

Luke 16:4

"4 I know what I shall do, so that when I am removed from the management people will welcome me into their homes."

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Luke 16:5-7

"5 And he summoned each one of his master's debtors, and he began saying to the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' 6 And he said, 'A hundred measures of oil.' And he said to him, 'Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty.' 7 Then he said to another, 'And how much do you owe?' And he said, 'A hundred measures of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, and write eighty.'"

Luke 16:8

"8 And his master praised the unrighteous manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the sons of this age are more shrewd in relation to their own kind than the sons of light."

Use your worldly wealth to make everlasting friends. (16:9)

Be faithful with what you do possess so that you can receive something far better. (6:10-12)

Do not allow riches to become your God. (16:13)

Luke 16:8-9

"8 And his master praised the unrighteous manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the sons of this age are more shrewd in relation to their own kind than the sons of light. 9 And I say to you, make friends for yourselves by means of the wealth of unrighteousness, so that when it fails, they will receive you into the eternal dwellings."

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Lesson #1

Literally, "they [i.e., the friends you have made with your worldly wealthy] will receive you into eternal dwellings."

Luke 6:10-12

"10 He who is faithful in a very little thing is faithful also in much; and he who is unrighteous in a very little thing is unrighteous also in much. 11 Therefore if you have not been faithful in the use of unrighteous wealth, who will entrust the true riches to you? 12 And if you have not been faithful in the use of that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own?"

Lesson #2

Be faithful with what you have so that you can receive something even better.

Luke 6:13

"13 No servant can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

Lesson #3

Do not let money and material things become your master.

The central point
of Jesus' use of this parable was
not because the steward cheated,
but because he exercised foresight
into the future.

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A right use of our money in this world, from right motives, will be for our benefit in the world to come. It will not justify us. It will not bear the severity of God's judgment, any more than other good works. But it shall be an evidence of our grace, which shall befriend our souls.

Let's take an honest gut check of what we really are giving to the Kingdom.

Keep in mind that mammon (wealth or riches) refers to all of our material possessions.

The words of Christ are tougher than Moses' words in the Book of the Law.

One instance among thousands
Of the uncertainty of human life
And the instability of earthly possessions
And enjoyments.
Born to ample property
He for several years experienced
A distressing reverse of fortune
And no sooner was he restored to
His former affluence
Than it pleased Divine Providence
To withdraw this together with his life.

READER:

Be thou taught by this
To seek those riches which never can fail
And those pleasures
Which are at God's right hand
For evermore
The gracious gift of God
And to be enjoyed through faith
In JESUS CHRIST our Savior.

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
