II. Exposition

A. Luke 18:35-37

- 1. Where does a blind person go for help in first century Palestine? The street.
- 2. Multitude following Jesus Probably due to the raising of Lazarus
- 3. Blindness Thought to be God's judgment a. John 9:1-2
- B. Luke 18:38-39
 - 1. An uncustomary address "Son of David"
 - a. Messianic and directly linked to the Davidic Covenant – II Samuel 7:12-14
 - 2. "Have mercy on me"
 - a. A cry for mercy Psalm 4:1; 41:4; 51:1
 - 3. Verse 39, Persistence
- C. Luke 18:40-41
 - 1. Mark adds Mark 10:49-50
 - 2. He was <u>not</u> born blind.

- D. Luke 18:42-43
 - 1. Healed with a touch Matthew 20:34
 - 2. "Your faith has healed you."
 - a. Faith is a gift from God Ephesians 2:8.
 - b. So is Repentance a gift II Timothy 2:25.
 - c. Physical healing, yes, but also spiritual
 - d. A. T. Robertson
 - e. Greek word used for "well" is the common term for salvation.
 - 3. Glorify God
 - 1. Worship of God is the expected response to redemption.

III. Points for Reflection

- A. Luke's use of miracles demonstrates our sinful brokenness and need for God's redemptive action to do what we cannot do for ourselves.
- B. It is not the act of faith that saves but rather the object that saves Christ.
- C. Spiritual sight is completely an act of God's grace whereby He opens the eyes of sinners to see their need for rescue and redemption.
- D. True faith is comprised of three parts knowledge, belief, trust.
- E. Given its history, it was insightful that this man gained his sight at Jericho.
