 - 3. Small in stature, verse 3.
 - 4. Desired a better look at Jesus.

 - 1. "Hurry and come down" Imperative!
 - 2. Jesus stopped for him. Sovereignty of God.
 - a. J.C. Ryle.

 - 1. The beginning of faith personal trust.

 - 1. Intense disapproval of the crowd Luke 4:16-19
- E. Luke 19:8-9
 - 1. "Behold, Lord" Transformation.
 - a. Romans 10:9-10
 - 2. Repentance in action
 - a. Restitution
 - 1. Exceeds maximum levels of the law.
 - a. Ex. 22:1; Num. 5:6-7
 - 3. Behavior changing You see something else, too!
