## Insights from Luke

#90 – "Clear and Present Danger" – Luke 22:31-38

- I. Introduction
  - A. Times in Pastor Don's life when he felt danger.
    - 1. Mission field experience.
  - B. Jesus is in danger and so are the disciples.
- II. Exposition
  - A. Luke 22:31
    - 1. Danger was noted in last week's sermon.
    - 2. Note repetition "Simon, Simon."
    - 3. Distinctives of Peter.
      - a. First disciple to be called.
      - b. First to confess Jesus was the Christ.
      - c. First to exit the boat and walk on water.
    - 4. Note plural use of "you" a reference to not only Peter, but all the disciples.
  - B. Luke 22:32
    - 1. Singular usage of "you" directed to Peter alone.
  - C. Luke 22:33
    - 1. Pride before the fall
  - D. Luke 22:34
    - 1. The prophecy is bleak a threefold denial is on the horizon.
    - 2. Illustration from Afghanistan
      - a. "The Titanic of all testimonies," Philip Ryken.
  - E. Luke 22:35-36
    - 1. At first glance, it seems out of place.
      - a. Jesus had told the disciples earlier to take supplies.
        - 1. Luke 9:3; 10:4
      - b. Now a shift in ministry support is in view.
        - 1. Going to the nations would require support.

- c. Wrong understanding of this text. The sword reference is used as justification for violence in order to advance the kingdom.
  - 1. Note John 18:10 and Luke 22:51
    - a. Jesus does NOT advocate the means of force.
- d. The weapons of the kingdom are not of this world.
  - 1. II Corinthians 10:4
- e. The sword reference is symbolic of warfare (spiritual warfare).
  - 1. Robert Stein
  - 2. Philip Ryken

## F. Luke 22:37

- 1. The hatred of Jesus is clearly in view and foretold.
  - a. Note tie-in to Isaiah 53:12
  - b. Many New Testament authors drew connection to Isaiah 53.
    - 1. John 12:38; Acts 8:32-33; Rom. 10:16; I Peter 2:22
- G. Luke 22:38
  - 1. "It is enough" or "Enough of this talk". They did not get it.

## III. Points for Reflection

- A. "Satan has demanded to have you, that he might sift you like wheat" (Luke 22:31) is a sober reminder to all who take leadership positions in Christ's church.
  - 1. I Peter 5:8
- B. We are at our <u>best</u> when we are broken, humble, and dependent.
  - 1. Luke 22:32; II Corinthians 12:10
- C. If we do fail we know that Jesus has prayed for us in advance so that if sin has occurred, faith may never fail.
  - 1. Luke 22:32; Romans 3:21-26; 8:34; Heb. 7:25
- D. He identified with us at our worst.
  - 1. Lk 22:37; Isa. 53:12; II Cor. 5:21; Gal. 3:10-13; I Pet. 2:24
