    - 1. Pilate calls for a meeting of the minds.
    - 2. Pilate maintained Jesus' innocence.
    - 3. The punishment would be a compromise.

  - B. Luke 23:17
    - 1. Omitted by most translations. Mark 15:6-8

- C. Luke 23:18-19
  - 1. The crowd desired to have Him killed. Who were they?
    - a. Most certainly not Galileans.
  - 2. Everything appeared upside down.
    - a. Barabbas freed and Jesus killed
- D. Luke 23:20-21
  - 1. Pilate still is looking for a way out while the crowd wanted crucifixion.
    - a. Matthew 27:22
  - 2. A riot  $\rightarrow$  Matthew 27:24
- E. Luke 23:22-25
  - 1. "Insistence" of the crowd (Luke 5:1; Acts 27:20)
  - 2. Pilate did not want any responsibility.
    - a. Matt. 27:24
  - 3. Interface with the Sanhedrin Acts 5:28
  - 4. Convicted by their own words Acts 2:22-23
  - 5. Jesus scourged Matt. 27:26; Mark 15:15
- III. Points for Reflection
  - A. Satan's will vs. God's will. It was never a contest.
    - 1. John 8:44; Luke 22:3; Isaiah 53:4,10; Genesis 3:15
  - B. The sparing of Barabbas becomes a descriptive metaphor for the salvation of the wicked.

  - C. We do not know what became of Barabbas, but we may be sure of what becomes of us!
